Areas citywide. The program has dedicated victim advocates for survivors of domestic violence and additional advocates for victims of every other category of crime. The program provides supportive counseling, connections to individual or group therapy, and help navigating the legal and financial challenges that can emerge after a crime has occurred. This groundbreaking initiative, developed by the NYPD through a partnership with the Mayor's Office of Community Mental Health (formerly ThriveNYC), is implemented by Safe Horizon, the nation's largest and most comprehensive victim services provider.
